STARTING YOUR APPRENTICESHIP/TRAINING

Much more is expected of you in the workplace and you must balance this with other important aspects of your life.

Ask yourself:

- » Do you have a good understanding of your job role and qualification?
- » Is this a role you enjoy?
- » Do you have any concerns or find anything challenging?

Make sure you take time for any independent study tasks

Record and reflect on the opportunities you have taken in your role

Speak to your tutors, supervisors, parents/ carers about any concerns

DEVELOPING SKILLS AND CONSIDERING YOUR OPTIONS

Towards the end of your first year, you should start to consider your role. It may be that you have taken an apprenticeship within an industry or related career, but see yourself moving into something different.

Ask yourself:

- » Which skills have you developed in your current role?
- » Do your career interests require higher qualifications?
- » If so, what are their entry requirements?
- » What is available at your current workplace?

Participate in activities and take responsibilities that enhance the skills you will need for work and further study

Try something new with additional training or work shadowing

Be proactive - research application deadlines and opportunities

- » If staying at your workplace confirm a permanent position
- » If looking for alternatives research courses and vacancies
- » If applying to university (via UCAS) deadlines are in January (or earlier in October for certain courses e.g. Medicine, Veterinary and Dentistry)

WORK

- » Working in a job with or without training but not working towards any further or higher qualifications
- » You may be expected to work 35 to 40 hours
- for a full-time role and will earn the national minimum wage or above
- Some roles may require experience or specific skills in order to progress

HIGHER APPRENTICESHIPS & SCHOOL LEAVER PROGRAMMES

- » Working in a specific role, whilst studying towards a higher education level qualification
- » Salaries may vary and tuition fees for the qualification are funded by employers/ the government
- » Available in around 50 subjects from advertising to security intelligence
- » Entry requirements vary e.g. 5 GCSEs at a pass rate or above and some require specific A Levels or equivalent

FURTHER SPECIALISED TRAINING

- » Studying a specialist vocational course at a further education college or professional training provider
- » Depending on your age, you may need to pay tuition fees - check with individual
- providers and the Education Funding Agency
- » Gain the professional qualifications to enter a specific job role including a chef, tree surgeon, hairdresser and more

GAP YEAR

- » A period of time taken after completing your qualifications at 18 before beginning your next qualification.
- » It is important to develop transferable skills during this year to aid future employment or qualifications
- » Some people volunteer and learn a new craft such as teaching English as a foreign language or complete various paid or unpaid work experience placements

DEGREE APPRENTICESHIPS & SPONSORED DEGREES

- » Combining employment and studying for a full honours degree
- » Tuition fees may be funded by employers/ the government
- » You may be contracted to work for the company for a fixed period of time after completion of your degree
- » Available in a range of sectors including Chartered Surveying, Aerospace Engineering and Public Relations
- » Entry requirements vary e.g. 5 GCSEs at a pass rate or above and some require specific A Levels or equivalent

UNIVERSITY

- » Study for an undergraduate degree (3 or 4 years) in one of 37,000 subjects at UK universities and colleges
- » Tuition fees vary depending on your course and provider, most students take out a student loan to cover tuition fees and costs of living
- » Courses can include work placements and

- overseas study opportunities
- » Entry requirements vary e.g. 5 GCSEs at a pass rate or above and some require specific A Levels or equivalent
- » Universities and colleges also provide Foundation Degrees to prepare students for undergraduate study
